Lorain Catholic High School, which opened in 1969, was created as one of two regional Catholic high schools for the Lorain, Ohio, area. Seven IHM Sisters taught that first year, and 389 students were enrolled.

At the end of the 1969-1970 school year, the convent chronicler wrote, "Lorain Catholic was new to everyone this year. It was a challenge, but still an unforgettable experience."

Enrollment grew rapidly, reaching more than 750 by the fall of 1972. The literary magazine was added to the school's clubs; track was added to the athletic program; and the number of girls' sports increased that year as well.

The chronicler reported, "Through the efforts of the Athletic Booster Club, a full-size stadium was built during the summer of 1972." This stadium was "the first step in a plan to develop the back property."

During the 1974-75 academic year, the 818 students enjoyed a windfall of more than \$274,000, thanks to Ohio House Bill 993, which provided private schools with money for AV materials, typewriters and the salaries of "auxiliary staff," such as reading instructors. As a result, Lorain Catholic instituted a full-time reading program.

The Class of 1977, our [featured class year](#), graduated June 5. The class was composed of 188 students who will celebrate their 30th [class reunion](#) July 14. They remember their school days fondly.

Mark Hilenski recalls **George Renner's** historic climb of "Mount Chapel." **Patti O'Connor Boguski** says one of her most memorable recollections was when "A group of us girls went to breakfast at Perkins our senior year. The convent chronicler reported during the 1983-84 school year that "Our enrollment is suffering a

decrease each year due to the poor economic situation...Lorain Catholic is struggling for survival." The last IHM Sister left in 1986, and the school closed in 2004.
