A Closer Walk (Produced by Worldwide Documentaries, 2003)

A Closer Walk was the first film to depict humankind's confrontation with the global AIDS epidemic. The film focuses on the underlying causes of AIDS; the relationship between health, dignity and human rights; and the universal need for action, compassion and commitment to counter what has become the worst plague in human history.

Angels in America (HBO, 2003)

This made-for-TV version of Tony Kushner's five-hour play is a film adaptation of what was a defining artistic statement documenting the political and social upheaval that HIV/AIDS brought to America's gay community and to the wider America around it.

Out of Control: AIDS in Black America (ABC *Primetime*, 2006)

As the world marked the 25th anniversary of the first reported cases of AIDS, one important story was mostly ignored: AIDS is an epidemic in the African American community and it's spreading fast. Shortly before his cancer diagnosis, Peter Jennings started work on this one-hour documentary devoted solely to the issue of AIDS in Black America.

On Thursday, November 7, 1991, Earvin "Magic" Johnson made people stop and watch at The Forum in Inglewood, California. The 32 year-old ground-breaking point guard was holding a press conference to announce to the world that he was HIV-positive.

Philadelphia (1993)

Tom Hanks plays a gay lawyer who is unjustly fired by his firm because he has AIDS. Denzel Washington is another lawyer who reluctantly takes the case and learns to overcome his misconceptions about the disease, about those who contract it, and about gay people in general.

Where Have All the Parents Gone? (CNN, 2006)

This documentary, narrated by Christiane Amanpour, focuses on AIDS orphans and the people who care for them.

Yesterday (Videovision, 2005)

Yesterday brings an intimate human perspective to the AIDS crisis in Africa, putting a human face on a global crisis that's too often viewed in impersonal terms.
