



Spirituality? Religion?

- Today it is not unusual to hear people say, "I am spiritual but not religious."
- They usually mean that they are on a personal spiritual quest which is not linked to any organized religious body such as Christianity or Buddhism.
- Spirituality is a very elastic word.
- It usually means a search for the sacred, the ultimate, which gives meaning to life.



Religion



- "Religion" comes from the Latin religio, which means to "bind together." Healthy religion enables people and communities to integrate all dimensions of their lives.
- A specific religion can be spoken of in the language of "creed" (what I/we believe), "code" (ethics) and "cult" (communal ritual, personal prayer and meditation).

Spirituality is "the experience of conscious involvement in the project of life-integration through self-transcendence towards the ultimate value one perceives."

Dimensions of Spirituality

"Conscious involvement"—a person creates their spirituality over their lifetime and so it develops organically.

All life experiences become the matrix of our spirituality.

"Life integration "—there is no split between spirituality and "life."
We live our spirituality in the world in all its dimensions.
There is no "abstract" spirituality.


"Self-transcendence "—I am not sufficient of

myself. Search and desire are the inner dynamics of spirituality.


"Ultimate value "—What is the "pearl of great price" for which a person would give everything?




World Religions and Spirituality: African Traditional Religion, Buddhism




World Religions and Spirituality: Christianity and Judaism








