
Christmas Tribute Tree donors provide a valuable gift

Her "call" to the IHM congregation as a young teen grew out of the loving support of her Irish immigrant parents, especially her mother. Peggy's dad, a bus driver, was tragically killed in a pedestrian accident leaving mom, a practical nurse, to raise John, Michael and his young daughter, Peggy.



Peggy's academic degree preparations (bachelor's and master's degrees in education; and a Master of Divinity degree in theology) and lifelong service are undergirded by her guiding mantra: "God leads us where we did not plan to go." As expressed in the IHM Constitutions: "We hear the cry of all God's people, especially of the poor and abandoned."
