We just heard the story of Jesus calling his disciples by name. Take a minute and think about your own call, when and how you sensed it. Did it happen all at once or gradually over time? Mine was over a period of years. What about yours? ...take a minute.

However, our calls happened, like the disciples, Jesus set his gaze upon us in love and invited us to be in the world as he was in the world---in mission. We will never know what Jesus saw in that motley crew of disciples, or in us, but his love extended beyond their/our frailties and limitations to make them/us what we were called to be-witness to the love, inclusiveness, mercy and generosity of God.

What does that original call look like now? What is the call when we are in relationship with someone whose personality grates us the wrong way? What is the call when someone acts like they are in charge and their way is the right or only way? What is the call when someone doesn't listen and must have the last word? What is the call when misunderstandings happen? What is the call in every day, real life?

All these smaller calls happen and need to be kept in the larger perspective and context of our call to make love visible in our world through our prayer and action on behalf of justice.

Saying yes to the call of each day is only possible if our gaze and hearts are set upon Jesus as his is set upon us. The prayer attributed to Fr. Pedro Arupe was actually written by Joseph Whelan, SJ and seems a good summary.
